We use our current cooker every day and it is now 4 years old. It is a domestic cooker and it is no longer working properly. It has shorted our electricity supply on one occasion, and it is very unreliable for temperature, which has a big impact when we are cooking for large groups. Almost every group we host is impacted by the unreliability of it.

How many people will benefit from this project?

Will any specific groups benefit from this project? (male, female, age range or protected characteristic)

Almost all our centre participants will benefit from a new cooker. Our age range covers 1 - 101, many cultures and from all social groups.

The youth cook group use it every Thursday, including cooking for our Come Dine With Us sessions where we invite and cook for older local residents of the Coldside area who are at risk of being socially isolated. It is also used for 2 cooking workshops per week, which provides a hot lunch for our garden volunteers on Tuesdays and the community intercultural lunch on Fridays. Both these shared meals have fed up to 50 people at a time. We have a volunteer who makes soup each week for our Cosy Corner, plus we have numerous workshops and events that require catering. During the school holidays, the children who attend our garden club take it in turns to cook lunch for the whole group each day. It is therefore a bit of a catastrophe if the cooker fails or doesn't cook the food in time.

What local consultation has taken place regarding this application?

When we have asked for feedback from our participants, this has frequently been mentioned.

Our Come Dine With Us event has been impacted by the temperamental cooker and they have requested a better cooker. All our cooking groups have commented on the inaccurate temperature and how it affects their workshops.

How will the project / activity tackle deprivation or benefit those experiencing deprivation? (Refer to Section 1 of the Guidance Notes)

We provide hot meals for our Cosy Corner participants, older residents of Coldside, the children who attend our garden clubs, local school children, the cooking groups who are learning to use the garden produce and our free community lunches. Unfortunately, a weakness in our local community is the high concentration of deprivation. There is extensive research evidence of the relationship between deprivation and health conditions. Poor mental health, obesity and a high incidence of type II diabetes are all hallmarks of our community. Our project aims to tackle these issues by providing services and activities that support groups and individuals to make positive changes that can address issues related to poverty, debt, unemployment and health.

Through research and experience we have found attending our groups and activities is invaluable in terms of improving physical and mental health.

Our activities provides members of the local community with access to long term, dignified solutions to issues of food insecurity. Participants have increased knowledge about what can be harvested from the garden, foraged from outdoors,

know how fresh produce can be prepared and stored for later. Many project participants report improvements in diet and health.

How do you intend to monitor the project Outputs and Outcomes?

Monitoring will be done primarily through accurate, daily records of all kitchen users and the purpose of the visit. This data will be reviewed monthly to establish whether attendance in any areas has changed significantly, we can then investigate and adapt our services accordingly. We primarily use the charity monitoring software Upshot for reporting.

To assess impact and evaluate our service, we will seek feedback at individual events and regular classes via questionnaires and informal interviews. We regularly carry out and review case studies of individual service users, groups and volunteers.

We utilise social media by using Facebook and Twitter to actively encourage feedback.

We adopt the best practice in terms of evaluation and currently produce annual social accounts that demonstrate the difference the project is making, these reports are available on our website or copies can be obtained from the centre.
