The grant is to allow the opportunity for members from Douglas and Brooksbank Arts & crafts groups to come together to visit the Craft Fair in Glasgow. Many of the participants face financial or transport barriers that prevent them from attending larger craft events further from home.

A grant would help to cover the cost of transportation, entry tickets to the event and potentially supplement meals or materials, ensuring that cost is not a limiting factor.

The group members would be able to access a reduction in entry to the event through numbers attending. (Greater than 10). With up to 30 people benefitting.

This would be an inclusive opportunity bringing together individuals with shared creative interests which can foster a deeper sense of community and belonging. This experience can lead to long-term collaboration, mutual inspiration and stronger support networks beyond their usual weekly group, fostering friendships, peer support, shared learning and growth in confidence, etc.

This craft event features workshops and demonstrations with new materials and techniques people may not otherwise have access to. Attending such events broadens their skills, boosts confidence and reignites creative passion.

Many of the group members attend these groups to enrich their mental wellbeing, create social connections and personal fulfilment. Indeed, many teach others new

This project is needed to address the social, financial and practical barriers that prevent members of these local arts and crafts groups from accessing larger events beyond their immediate area. Many of the individuals are isolated, on low incomes, or lack access to transportation which limits their opportunities for cultural engagement, skill development, and meaningful social connection.
Attending a craft event 80 miles away offers more than just a day out – it provides a rare opportunity for participants to be inspired, learn new techniques, meet other makers, and feel part of a wider creative community. For many, this kind of experience is not otherwise possible. The project supports wellbeing, reduces isolation, encourages creative growth, and strengthens community bonds, making it both timely and impactful.
What local consultation has taken place regarding this application? (Please attach evidence summarising the results of any consultation)
Group members came to me (group leader) asking if there was any way they could attend the craft fair together. Through word of mouth and conversations with other like-minded groups the project was born. With up to three local groups benefitting from the experience.

What evidence do you hold that the local community supports this application?

(For example, was it proposed by members of a particular group? Does it directly address need identified by community members?)

Yes, the project was proposed by members of the Douglas Healthy Me group. Local community members who attend the arts & crafts groups have expressed a strong desire to connect with others who share their interests beyond their immediate area. Many have shared that they feel creatively limited by their current environment and are eager for new inspiration, learning opportunities, and a sense of being part of something bigger.

However, they also identified several barriers: the cost of travel, the lack of group transportation options, and limited mobility due to age, disability, or financial constraints. For some, this would be their first chance to attend a larger craft event, something they see as both exciting and personally meaningful.

This project directly responds to their voices by offering a supported, inclusive way for them to attend a craft event 80 miles from home – removing the practical obstacles and creating a shared experience that fosters creativity, connection and confidence.

- "I'd love to go to something bigger, but I just can't afford the travel on my own"
 "I haven't been out of town for years. If we could go together as a group, I'd feel
 much more confident about going"
- "I want to learn more techniques, but it's hard to find workshops that aren't miles away"
- "It would be amazing to see new crafts and meet other people who enjoy the same things"

How will the project / activity tackle deprivation or benefit those experiencing deprivation? (Refer to Section 1 of the Guidance Notes)

The project will benefit individuals experiencing social and economic deprivation by providing access to a cultural opportunity they would otherwise be unable to afford or reach. Many of the participants involved come from low – income backgrounds, live in underserved areas, or face additional barriers such as limited mobility, poor mental health, and/ or social isolation.

By covering transport and associated costs, the project removes key financial and practical barriers, enabling equal access to a valuable experience that promotes wellbeing, learning and inclusion.

Attending the craft event will:

- Support mental health by offering a positive, social, and inspiring environment.
- Reduce social isolation by fostering friendships and connections with likeminded people.
- Encourage personal growth by exposing participants to new ideas, skills, and opportunities for creative development.
- Boost confidence and a sense of belonging, especially for those who may feel excluded from mainstream cultural activities.

Many people often lack access to enrichment activities that promote self – expression, learning, and wellbeing. This project directly addresses that gap by creating a shared, uplifting experience that empowers participants and strengthens their community ties.
