A four-day outdoor residential adventure to Nethy Bridge Forest Village for 16 young people (YP) facing marginalisation, poverty, or trauma. The YP will help plan the residential, from activities to budgeting and provisioning. They will enjoy instructor-led outdoor activities, star-gazing and reflective moments, team and confidence building, and individual support.

How many people will benefit from this project?		

Will any specific groups benefit from this project? (male, female, age range or protected characteristic)

Within the YP engaging with HCT we will target those who have never had an opportunity like this before e.g. due to poverty, school non-attendance etc.

No independent research describes the city centre subculture of YP engaging with Hot Chocolate so we conduct our own anonymized survey to explore YP's life circumstances. From our July 2025 research:

- 86% were aged 15-19
- 76% white scottish; 11% mixed ethnicity; 8% white non-UK; 4% gypsy/traveller
- 53% identify as LGBTQ+; 30% idenfity differently from their birth-assigned gender
- 33% are neurodivergent; 14% awaiting diagnosis and 20% "unsure"
- 27% have a disability
- 61% live in the most deprived neighbourhoods (SIMD 1-2); 22% in the 5% most deprived
- 20% are not in education/employment/training; 34% were excluded from school
- 48% have a mental health condition and 33% were unsure
- 53% struggle with anxiety; 44% with depression; 29% with an eating disorder
- 40% have self-harmed and 29% have attempted suicide
- 55% use drugs most days/weeks and 36% alcohol
- 28% report having committed a crime; 47% have been the victim; 36% have witnessed a crime. 9% have been arrested.

We will lead an outdoor pursuits residential weekend for 20 vulnerable YP, creating respite, building trust, confidence, skills and memorable experiences.

The YP we will target cannot afford to access activities or go away for a trip like this and for some even a token payment is a barrier to access. Therefore, we will fully fund the weekend but YP "buy in" through taking responsibility before and during the weekend. Small groups will work with youth workers in the weeks before to plan and organize different elements e.g. choosing tutored activities, planning and leading other activities (e.g. games, bonfires), putting together care packs (e.g. time-out activities, self-care tools), catering and travelling plans etc.

Given the complex needs evidenced above, the first impact is respite – YP repeatedly tell us the value of getting away from their normal lives for once, relieving the stresses and expectations and experiencing themselves in new ways. Equally, this "get-away" can unlock difficult emotions and responses for some which is why we invest in their agency to help organize everything, in building a culture of mutual care within the weekend, and in a 1:2 ratio of youth workers (paid and volunteers) to YP.

Youth workers use the weekend to build trust, confidence and social skills/connections with and between the YP. We use informal education approaches to support YP to build the kind

of weekend they want to enjoy and to respond to and repair the moments when relationships break down. "Whether it's emotional or physical or mental, we always learn something... I don't know how [they] do it. It's like they sneak learning in the back door. I've learnt how to make badges, and I've learnt how to be more emotionally aware!"

Since many of the YP have found themselves often discounted for positive opportunities, the activities are chances to discover unknown aptitudes as well as to develop their skills, including soft skills of team-work, communication, task-focus etc. and the particular skills of climbing, archery etc. The impact on YP's confidence and sense of self is invaluable. Finally, YP will be supported to reflect on their own and each other's growth as well as feedback on learning about the residential experience. This embeds the positive memories and sense of achievement to build resilience as they return to challenging situations. Youth workers will reflect on and follow up with support to the needs and ambitions that YP have shared during the weekend to inform positive next steps together.

Reflections on previous, similar projects:

"It was just a miniature getaway for two days. I got to know more people from here who I didn't talk to and I enjoyed myself after being stressed for a few months – it was amazing." "It made me realise that I don't want to just be, you know, stuck in Dundee. I need to see what else I can do with my life."

What local consultation has taken place regarding this application?

The first consultation is drawing from YP's feedback on similar activities in recent years showing the impact of these kinds of experiences and the youth work support provided through them (as is reflected above).

In our research in July 40% said that residential opportunities are important and the highest area YP wanted support was around money (47%).

In the period leading up to the residential a youth worker (in a new post, focussing on supporting YP into more physical active lifestyles) will be exploring barriers to physical activity with YP and thus identify those who want to find new ways to be more active. Their feedback about how to overcome those barriers will be used to shape the residential.

What evidence do you hold that the local community supports this application? (For example, was it proposed by members of a particular group? Does it directly address need identified by community members?)

The desire to undertake this kind of trip is reflected frequently in YP's youth work engagements. For example, collaborative planning for summer trips highlighted, again, requests for outdoor activities (leading to an archery day trip next week).

It is a very common response from adults in our community that "there needs to be more for the young ones to do". Outdoor activities, similarly, are widely valued for their appeal and beneficial impacts.

How will the project / activity tackle deprivation or benefit those experiencing deprivation? (Refer to Section 1 of the Guidance Notes)

As noted, the activity creates access to experiences which are otherwise beyond the financial reach of the YP. By charging no fee but building in YP's agency and leadership in developing the plans for and delivery of the residential, we both remove the financial barrier and build dignity and worth. YP develop their skills and experience themselves as contributors and makers. This builds confidence, responsibility and ambition.

YP describe the impact of this residential in terms of expanded horizons, new sense of self, and a refreshing and nurturing of personal resilience.

"I felt connected to nature and connected to myself. Talking to the other people on the residential, it changed my perspective that I was alone, cause I'm not."

How do you intend to monitor the project Outputs and Outcomes?

All youth work engagements, during planning and the residential, will be followed by reflective debrief: youth workers discuss and record activities, the most significant things YP have said/shown/done, and professional observations. These are written as a letter to the YP, which grounds recordings in rich, accountable relationship and constitutes a constructive resource for YP when/if they choose to read the recordings. The recordings and letters are stored and analysed within HC's bespoke evaluation database, Teckle Data. These letters form the basis for judging YP's progress against outcomes, drawing statistical records of engagements and outcomes from little-and-often, narrative recordings.

At the end of the residential YP will be supported to share their immediate reflections. At the review and celebration meeting a couple of weeks after the residential they will explore their experience, impacts, and learning for the future in more depth.
