Please give a description of what you want this grant for - (please limit your answer to 500 words or less)

This grant will allow us to provide a free festive afternoon celebration with food, music and entertainment for some of the most elderly members of our community. It will bring together elderly and vulnerable members of our local community from across the ward, where they will be served a 3 course meal with refreshments, whilst also enjoying the entertainment. This helps address issues of isolation, whilst increasing levels of wellbeing and self-worth for all these individuals. The event will be open to older people living across the Strathmartine ward, and will be publicised accordingly. Transport will be provided by volunteers at no cost to any participants who are less able and who would otherwise be unable to attend, taking them from their homes to the event and back home again to ensure that no one is left out.

A free raffle ticket is given to everyone attending the event, where between prizes purchased and a large number of prizes donated by parishioners and volunteers, it means that up to half of the elderly participants will win a prize, which always brings a lot of excitement to them all.

Since we re-started the party 3 years ago after Covid we have noticed it has been very well attended (with more people attending each year) and was greatly appreciated by everyone. We always have a number of new guests that haven't been before who loved the event and asked to be notified of future parties. We have already been approached by a few elderly people asking if it will be running again this year, as they are looking forward

to getting out for an enjoyable afternoon again. Given the cost of living crisis at the moment this brings some relief where they will receive a good meal, refreshments and a warm space without worrying about costs or struggles for a little while. We've even gift leftover food after the party to a few guests who have taken it home to friends or neighbours who didn't make the party.

Dundee will be a caring city which has tackled the root causes of poverty and delivered fairness, in incomes, education and health.

A reduction in social isolation and loneliness amongst older people will result in improved physical and mental health

All residents will have pride in Dundee and a sense of identity and belonging to the area

The number of residents living in fuel and food poverty will be reduce

This will be open to 100 elderly people from the Strathmartine ward.

This event will give elderly people the opportunity to come together, getting them out of their homes, allowing them to socialise with others and also meet new people, reducing the feeling of isolation at a time of year when it is dark and cold. Exercise will also be provided in the form of dancing for participants who are able and happy to join in. Elderly people need to be getting out and mixing with people without worrying about anything.

Also, without this support, a charge would have to be made for the event and this would exclude an increasing number of participants who would be unable to afford it given the financial situation at the moment.

What local consultation has taken place regarding this application?

Parish Council Social Committee, Sheltered Housing Complexes, homes and wider communities. Also the cosy space lunch on a Wednesday has brought more new people into the hall and we will advertise it there and at St Columba's weekly cosy space too as well as to St Columbas (in Kirkton) parishioners and neighbours.

What evidence do you hold that the local community supports this application?

No evidence as such, but given the cost of living rises added to the fact many elderly people are barely leaving their homes and the fact we've been approached or contacted by people who have attended the party previously and are eager to see it take place again.

It will bring together some of the most vulnerable people in society (elderly) at the time of year when isolation is higher due to the bad, cold & dark weather, with people not being able to get out of their houses much, and also when people are so concerned about money.

The accounts show £85,776 in the bank at the year end, however due to a number of improvements made within the church & hall this year in preparation for the 50th celebration of the opening of the church in April 2025 we spent a further £54,667. This included installation of a disabled toilet, a new altar, a new entrance to the chapel, a new confessional space created (to make way for disabled toilet) and this leaves us with a current balance of £33,966.

The church has also tried to set aside reserves over a number of years as the heating system is now 50 years old and when it finally breaks down completely it's anticipated to cost at least £40,000+ to fully replace. We will now need to look to start building our reserves to cover this when the need arises. We have been told the last fix that was done to the heating would likely be the last one possible due to the age of the system.

What other documents are you attaching to evidence the budget costs for this application?

Copies of last year's receipts are attached which show the previous party costs and these are only likely to increase quite a bit given rise in costs.

The caterer has just contacted us via text message to state that until she knows the exact number of meals required it's difficult for her to quote exactly, however she estimates the cost this year will be £12 - £12.50 per head.
