The grant is to facilitate inter-generational working between our service users and the local Rowantree Primary School. Mid-Lin's intention is to create "friendships groups" between some of the city's most isolated and vulnerable adults and the vulnerable pupils within the Cherry Tree group to work. We endeavour to promote safety through citizens of Dundee passing on a wealth of knowledge and understanding to the youth of today. This will carry out through tasks which include but are not restricted to litter picking, play park tidying, residents garden support, open spaces cleaning, growing flowers and vegetables in our raised beds, working on proposed art projects to enhance the area.

The grant is to buy PPE such as cover all's, Hi-Viz gloves, boots, helmets and eye protection. It will also be used to cover small costs such as refreshments and rewards for the pupils.

Service users will support, guide and encourage the young people and, because of their own needs, not take a physical part in activities. That will be the duty of our staff

and the partners we will work with.

Those partners are Scottish Fire & Rescue Community Team, Rowantree PS, St Ninians Episcopal Church and Dundee United Sports Club. Police Scotland Youth

How many people will benefit from this project?

Will any specific groups benefit from this project? (male, female, age range or protected characteristic)

The Cherry Tree group is for pupils who cannot fit into mainstream education for a variety of reasons. Through expanding it to include other pupils and Midlin service users alongside partners the hoped for benefit is to support the School to integrate the young people into mainstream learning.

Around 40 over 65s will benefit from this project who all have protected characteristics. These include cognitive impairments, mobility issues as well as life limiting health conditions. We hope that we can reach around 40 different young adults and children through this project. We hope to show these individuals that it doesn't matter how old you are, your background, sex or beliefs that working together can promote confidence, innovation and happiness and growth which will filter into our local community. We hope that families of the local children will also benefit from this work as their will be an improvement in their self-esteem, a healthier attitude will be promoted, support creative problem-solving which can be used throughout their lives. As well as endless opportunities to learn respect and admiration for the older generations will be introduced which we hope to have

a positive effect on the younger people when they are with their families and within the local community

The project is essential to actively encourage intergenerational working. The benefits of such work are to discover that people of all ages and backgrounds have more in common than previously assumed. By working in tandem, we can reduce fears young people may have of the elderly and vice versa. Help keep family memories/history alive by sharing them with our peers.

"Ultimately it is important that in developing a greater sense of community and social cohesion together with the effective support networks and connections to prevent social isolation and loneliness there needs to be an understanding of and reach across different generational groups"

As we are based in an area of depravity, we hope to support individuals to grow vegetables, thiswill be achieved by teaching youths about transforming food scraps into nutrient- rich compost, which boosts soil health for more nutritious vegetables. By growing your own vegetables and managing food waste we will be assisting local authorities to save money as well as our selves. Lessons in how to compost at home will help the fight to limit methane emissions, soil will improve, wildlife will be attracted to more gardens thus creating a thriving ecosystem. Being able to support families to cut costs whilst supporting good practices that support both the environment, local authority and intergenerational work must be beneficial to all.

What local consultation has taken place regarding this application? (Please attach evidence summarising the results of any consultation)

Within the day service we undertake 6 monthly reviews with our service users. Something that has been asked for is an increase in intergenerational work. One of our board members has met with the DHT of Rowantree Primary School there is real interest in this project from both parties.

We strive to increase social interaction through intergenerational working, increase social acceptance, compassion and empathy which is something many people do not recognise in a community setting.

This has come about through continuing work with the Cherry Tree Group and discussions between: Mid-Lin, Friends of Linlathen & Mid-Craigie (Neighbourhood Reprehensive Group), Rowantree PS and various other groups. All want this to be expanded, and we are happy at Mid-Lin to be the lead organisation in this. The community benefits if all in the community work together to achieve their aims for the young people.

How will the project / activity tackle deprivation or benefit those experiencing deprivation? (Refer to Section 1 of the Guidance Notes)

Both Rowantree Primary School and Mid-Lin Daycare Centre sit within a priority area for Dundee City Council. The city plan has outlined a Local Fairness Initiative for the Linlathen area, which sits in the 10% most deprived areas in Scotland and according to the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation 2020, has an overall ranking of 10 in the country.

Through our partnership approach and involvement in the Linlathen Fairness Initiative. Mid-Lin, Rowantree Primary School, Friends of Linlathen & Mid-Craigie (Neighbourhood Representative Group) and the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service have used a targeted approach to support children from Rowantree Primary School who were not fully engaged in a formal school setting.

The idea to target these children is to offer them positive learning experiences which encourage individual and group capacity building in a safe environment. The programme is designed to cover all four areas of the Curriculum for Excellence:

- Successful Learners
- Confident Individuals
- Responsible Citizens
- Effective Contributors

This programme encourages participants through participating in intergenerational learning and offers life of the school as a community.
